
# **Economic Inclusion Program**

The Economic Inclusion Program (EIP) is transforming the lives of India's most excluded households with a carefully designed, evidence-based model. This scalable, cost-effective program guides women through a 150-week, sequenced journey that integrates cash transfers with personalised support to create lasting change.

Since the program's first pilot in 2019, EIP has evolved from regional pilots to a phase of extensive scaling. Each pilot phase allowed us to adapt the program to the unique needs of different states, ensuring effective local adoption. What began as a modest program in two states has now expanded to seven, supported by a growing team of over 200 members. Key collaborations have strengthened EIP's reach, including a strategic partnership with a central ministry. Together with state and central governments, EIP is supporting more than 17,000 households within complex stakeholder environments.

In the past year, an independent assessment of EIP's first graduating cohort in Jharkhand - comprising 474 program participants ("didis") - highlighted significant improvements in several areas:

95%

of participants now consume three meals per day, up from 18% at the start.

of households now maintain kitchen gardens (up from <5%), and 99% access Public Distribution System (PDS) benefits, compared to 85% at baseline.

## Launch of Sarathi

To achieve EIP's vision at scale, The/Nudge has partnered with the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD) to develop and deploy Sarathi, a comprehensive tech platform launched in January 2024 by the Secretary, Ministry of Rural Development. Sarathi's role is pivotal in managing program activities and ensuring effective on-ground execution through real-time decision support.

## Our collaboration with government agencies

The/Nudge Institute has partnered with government agencies to integrate the Economic Inclusion Program (EIP) into social welfare frameworks, enhancing its impact across multiple states.

Partnerships with the Union Ministry of Social Justice and

Empowerment (MoSJE)

We signed an agreement with MoSJE to extend EIP's reach through the ministry. This collaboration enables us to integrate our program within the social welfare departments of these states, bringing essential resources and support directly to underserved communities.

## Partnerships with the Jharkhand State Government

We are partnering with the government of Jharkhand to support two state initiatives grounded in the EIP's graduation approach to benefit more than 130,000 households. The two schemes are:



Phulo Jaano Aashirwad Abhiyaan

Targeting women engaged in selling country liquor, this scheme provides alternative livelihood opportunities to improve economic and social outcomes.



Birsa Vishisht Jan Jatiya Vikas Yojana

Focused on providing livelihood opportunities and coaching to Particularly Vulnerable Tribal Groups (PVTG).









# Social Entrepreneurship

The/Nudge has supported over 150 nonprofits, led by entrepreneurs whose work brings transformative impact and scalable solutions to underserved communities.

## Program updates

In 2023, we launched our second livelihood-focused cohorts of Incubator and Accelerator, selecting from over 680 high-potential entrepreneurs who are addressing key barriers to sustainable livelihoods across India.





## Key events

The/Nudge has organised a series of impactful events in 2023, highlighting the achievements of our alumni and strengthening partnerships to support emerging social entrepreneurs.

#### 100+ alumni event

In August, we celebrated a significant milestone - the incubation of over 100 social impact startups. This gathering honoured the achievements of our alumni network, who continue to make strides in areas like skill development, financial inclusion, and environmental sustainability.

## MoU with Gujarat Livelihoods Promotion Company

The Nudge LifeSkills Foundation (NLF) signed an agreement with the Gujarat Livelihoods Promotion Company (GLPC) to establish the INR 50 crore Gujarat Social Entrepreneurship Fund (G-SEF). Over the next five years, G-SEF will provide grants to more than 150 startups, strengthening the social enterprise ecosystem in Gujarat and beyond.

### Co-hosting Tech for Impact track at Umagine

The/Nudge partnered with the Government of Tamil Nadu to co-host the Tech for Impact track at Umagine 2023, a premier summit on Technology, Entrepreneurship, and Skills. This three-day event spotlighted nonprofit startups supported by Incubator and Accelerator, showcasing technology-driven and sustainable solutions to a diverse audience of policymakers, funders, and innovators.







## A journey of an incubatee

#### Lighthouse Communities Foundation

Founded by Ruchi Mathur and Dr. Ganesh Natarajan in 2011, Lighthouse Communities Foundation (LCF) is driven by the mission to equip youth from low-income communities with the skills, confidence, and opportunities to achieve meaningful careers. Dr. Natarajan, an esteemed alumnus of BIT Ranchi, IIT Bombay, and IIM Mumbai (formerly NITIE), co-founded LCF on the belief that building self-agency is crucial for youth to succeed.

#### Program design and impact

LCF's Lighthouse program is designed to support "self-work" in young people, helping them develop the agency needed to navigate their chosen paths. Skilling centers, or "Lighthouses," serve as transformative spaces where youth can access training in areas that align with their interests and strengths. Beyond skills training, the program emphasises job placement and retention, ensuring that young people not only find work but also experience sustainable career growth.

#### Scalability through public-private partnerships

LCF's innovative public-private partnership model is key to its scalability. By combining government-funded infrastructure with corporate-backed operations, the Lighthouse program has expanded beyond its original locations in Maharashtra to reach Delhi, Hyderabad, and Odisha. This hybrid model allows for efficient resource allocation and enables rapid expansion to meet growing demand.

#### 2023 achievements

In 2023, Lighthouse Communities Foundation reached a significant milestone. securing INR 30.56 crore in funding—a 50% increase from the previous year. This increase in support facilitated job placements or self-employment opportunities for 8,143 youth, creating a potential annual incremental income impact of INR 19 crore. These achievements underscore LCF's ability to scale its model and provide transformative economic opportunities for youth across multiple states.

Lighthouse Communities Foundation exemplifies the impact of investing in self-agency and structured support, setting a powerful example for workforce development programs in India. Through continued growth, LCF is helping ensure that no young person is left behind in the journey toward economic empowerment.



# Indian Administrative Fellowship

## Program updates

The Indian Administrative Fellowship (IAF), launched by The/Nudge, fosters collaboration between seasoned private-sector leaders and visionary state government officials, bridging gaps in public systems to drive efficiency, innovation, and improved service delivery. Designed to accelerate public sector transformation, the fellowship empowers fellows to partner with government departments to strengthen program delivery and solve pressing governance challenges.

Since its inception in July 2021, IAF has brought together 35 fellows, each with over 15 years of private sector experience, to collaborate with civil servants across India. Together, these fellows have generated more than 65 governance recommendations, and positively impacted over 3.2 million (32 lakh) lives. Partnerships with the Administrative Training Institute in Mysore, the Ashoka Centre for Social and Behaviour Change, ISB, and NITI Aayog bootcamps have equipped fellows with insights and tools for high-impact public sector reforms.

This year, the ongoing IAF Punjab cohort achieved major milestones, with fellows enhancing technological processes through Enterprise resource planning (ERP) in the Punjab State Power Corporation and introducing tech solutions within the Mid Day Meal Scheme. We also renewed our partnership with the Karnataka government, launching the second IAF cohort in the state. From 590 applications, we selected ten distinguished fellows, strategically placed across various government departments to enhance bureaucratic efficiency and innovation. These fellows have been instrumental in projects such as developing Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) for waste management, establishing rural libraries, and reforming State Public Sector Undertakings (PSUs).

We launched the inaugural cohort with the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MoSJE) in New Delhi, marking the first IAF cohort embedded within a Central Ministry. This fellowship cycle attracted 608 applicants, out of which five exceptional fellows were selected to support critical government schemes, including the SMILE program, which addresses issues related to beggary, and the Venture Capital Fund aimed at socio-economic empowerment for marginalised SC/BC/DNT communities.

Looking ahead, the fellowship will extend to Jharkhand, with plans to reach additional states in the coming years.

India is at a precarious stage in its journey towards becoming a developed country. While on one hand, we are landing rovers on the moon, becoming a hub for startups, increasing the number of IIMs, IITs, and AIIMS, and aiming to become the third-largest economy, we have fumbled in including everyone in the country's progress. It doesn't take a public policy degree to see the inequalities in our society; a walk in the inner circle of Connaught Place (Delhi) would suffice. Can India really prosper without taking along the less privileged or those who have not been as fortunate? Can I truly lead a healthy, prosperous life if most people around me are grappling with basic necessities like education, health, and access to employment? Why are the government systems in place not working for everyone? Who are the people within this system? Can something be done to improve these systems?

The Indian Administrative Fellowship (IAF) was an opportunity for me to address the curiosity that had been growing within me. There is certainly something satisfying about getting to know your own country better, thinking at scale and making an impact towards a larger goal.

My experience with the Department of Governance Reforms, Punjab, has given me a better understanding of how government systems work, their strengths, constraints, and perhaps some shortcomings. Now, having taken up a full-time position in the development sector, I can surely say that the IAF was the stepping stone that allowed me to take up development sector roles, setting me up for a more gratifying part of my professional career.

## Prize

## Program updates

Building on prior challenges in agriculture and water, Prize turned its focus to an emerging area in 2023: the AgWater sector, where the need for sustainable water management is critical. In partnership with the DCM Shriram Foundation, we launched the "DCM Shriram AgWater Challenge" to enhance water security and improve the livelihoods of one million farmers. Unveiled in June 2023 with a prize purse of INR 2.6 crore, the challenge drew over 130 applications from tech-driven organisations across India, forming a cohort of 16 innovative teams committed to addressing the country's agwater crisis. With guidance from a panel of esteemed experts—including Hemendra Mathur, Arindom Datta, and Aruna Rangachar—the cohort is working toward practical, scalable solutions for India's complex water challenges in agriculture.

While the DCM AgWater Challenge began, the Ashirvad Water Challenge, launched in 2022, reached its final stage. After 18 rigorous months, SmartTerra and Solinas Integrity were announced as Winner and Runner-Up at the Grand Finale held in New Delhi on September 18, 2023. This challenge resulted in substantial impact, saving over 1.04 crore liters of water per month and improving access to water for more than 1.07 crore people. These achievements demonstrate the catalytic role of Prize in driving innovative, high-impact solutions for water security.

## Forum

Forum is a unique platform fostering impactful dialogue and partnerships among leaders in government, markets, and civil society. Driven by a vision of a poverty-free India, Forum seeks to build a thriving livelihood ecosystem through strategic conversations and collaborative actions that accelerate progress on India's development goals.

Since its inception in 2020, charcha has emerged as India's premier convening on livelihoods, uniting change-makers from various sectors to advance resilient, sustainable livelihoods. This forum of cross-sector dialogue encourages innovation and collaboration to tackle India's most pressing socio-economic challenges.

In August 2023, Forum hosted charcha 2023 at ISB Hyderabad, India's leading tech-driven gathering focused on livelihoods. The event brought together influential voices in livelihood, policy, technology, and market ecosystems, enabling high-impact dialogues around innovative solutions for poverty alleviation and economic resilience.

## Additional convenings in 2023-2024

Beyond charcha 2023, Forum organised sector-specific events to address critical areas within India's development landscape, deepening collaboration across sectors.

#### Pragati women-led social transformation convening

In partnership with Meta, The/Nudge Institute hosted the Pragati event at the Jio World Convention Center in Mumbai. This convening celebrated women's entrepreneurship, showcasing the "Pragati" cohort of women-led startups. Over 120 leaders from corporations, nonprofits, social enterprises, and policy organisations came together to explore ways to boost economic development for women entrepreneurs. The discussions focused on leveraging technology and support infrastructure to accelerate the scale and impact of women-led enterprises.

#### Roundtable on Developed India@2047

Charting the future of skilling & resilient livelihoods:

Held at the Bangalore International Centre, this roundtable brought together nine distinguished experts spanning industry, technology, policy, and civil society. The discussions highlighted urgent, transformative actions needed to build human capital and resilient livelihoods, with a focus on key themes such as:

- · Industry-aligned human capital development
- Transitioning from job-work to high-value IP creation and AI-powered services
- · Gender-responsive models to increase female workforce participation
- Formal migration corridors and skill-based employment for blue-collar workers
- Bridging vocational and academic pathways through skilling universities for youth employability
- · Al-driven, personalised education, and vocational-academic mobility

Through these convenings, Forum continues to expand its role as a catalyst for systemic change, facilitating meaningful conversations that align stakeholders toward sustainable solutions for resilient livelihoods in India.



# Other programs

The/Nudge Institute's early-stage programs aim to unlock new livelihood opportunities through innovation and entrepreneurship. With India needing approximately 100 million new livelihoods over the next decade to accommodate a growing labour force, these initiatives focus on scalable solutions for urban entrepreneurs, rural farmers, and underserved professionals.

## Urban Entrepreneurship

As millions of people migrate to cities in search of work, many turn to street vending, representing a significant portion of India's informal sector. Nearly 10 million individuals work as street vendors, selling fruits, vegetables, household goods, food, and more. However, they face numerous challenges:



#### Low earnings

Most households earn less than INR 25K per month, with limited growth.



## Lack of financial security

Minimal savings, no insurance, and high dependence on daily income make vendors vulnerable.



## Limited access to formal credit

High-interest informal lending is often the only option.



## Competition from e-commerce

Growing online markets reduce foot traffic.



## Educational barriers

Low literacy and numeracy levels limit growth opportunities.



To address these issues, The/Nudge has initiated a pilot program in Bengaluru in partnership with an NBFC. This program connects street vendors with affordable formal credit and financial literacy training. Through shared accountability and accessible loans, the pilot enables vendors to achieve financial stability and growth, setting a path for further inclusion in formal economic systems.

From the CEO's desk

As we look ahead, we are filled with a sense of purpose and determination to continue our work towards a poverty-free India. This past year has been one of significant progress. Our Economic Inclusion Program is supporting 7 state governments now to serve 200,000 of India's most excluded households with evidence-based poverty graduation model, and the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD) launched Sarathi, a comprehensive tech platform developed in partnership with The/Nudge, to enable economic inclusion journeys of the most marginalised across the country. We have also expanded our efforts to support smallholder farmers in rainfed areas in their transition to higher value crops and regenerative agriculture, through our ReFarm initiative.

Since 2017, our Social Entrepreneurship programs have supported over 150 early-stage entrepreneurs solving for the livelihoods of India's poor.
